US Views on REDD in the UNFCCC Negotiations

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Where We Are

- May 5th submission on key elements to be included in a Copenhagen agreement
 - notional agreed outcome
 - Addresses only a Framework Convention outcome
 - Silent on the relationship –if any to a next step under Kyoto
 - Reflects a structural approach with content under a sub-set of issues, including REDD-plus
- Elaboration of these REDD elements to follow represents technical staff level thinking
 - NOT official US position

Scope of REDD



- Options being discussed for scope of REDD – REDD, REDD+, AFOLU
- ultimate goal of comprehensive accounting of sources/sinks across land categories
 - Reflects "what the atmosphere sees"
 - Minimizes leakage, omissions, double-counting
- Recognize challenge of full terrestrial GHG accounting
 - Staged process could be applied

Financing



- Role for market and non-market financing
- Phased approach
 - 1. Self-financed actions
 - 2. Actions eligible for capacity building, technical assistance, financial support
 - 3. Actions eligible for market-based approaches

Market Finance



- Must ensure reductions are additional and that reversals are accounted for
- Development of standards, modalities and procedures can be informed by demonstration activities

Measurement, Reporting, Verification (MRV)

- Critical to future framework
 - Non-market
 - Relationship to broader MRV for national actions
 - Market
 - higher level of MRV needed for market-based eligibility
 - will require rigorous standards to ensure results are real and permanent

Reference Levels



- best starting point for creating reference levels is the use of historic data
- Adjusted over time
- difficult to accurately predict long-term future deforestation rates

Economic, Environmental, Social Impacts

- Local/Indigenous communities
- Biodiversity
- Other ecosystem services
- Countries have existing commitments under other international agreements related to forests and/or other land uses and associated "co-benefits"
 - national REDD-plus actions should be consistent with those commitments
- broad stakeholder participation and taking into account the needs and interests of local communities will allow for effective implementation and enduring results

Addressing Drivers of Deforestation/Degradation



- All Parties should find appropriate ways to reduce pressure on forests
- need to consider the dynamic links between population growth and the demands for food, fiber, and fuel that drive land use decisions
- If we fail to do so, pressures to expand the agricultural frontier, cut down forests for timber and other forest products, and other rational economic decisions, will only increase over time
